RE: ASC Compliance Review of Michigan's Appraiser Regulatory Program

Dear Amy Gumbrecht and Bryan Modelski:

The Appraisal Subcommittee (ASC) staff conducted an ASC Compliance Review (Review) of the Michigan appraiser regulatory program (Appraiser Program) on July 11–13, 2023, to determine the Program's compliance with Title XI of the Financial Institutions Reform, Recovery, and Enforcement Act of 1989.

The ASC considered the preliminary results of the Review and the State's response to those results. The Appraiser Program has been awarded an ASC Finding of "Good." The final ASC Compliance Review Report (Report) of the Michigan Appraiser Program is attached.

The ASC identified the following areas of non-compliance:

- States must ensure that persons analyzing work product for USPAP compliance must be knowledgeable about appraisal practice and USPAP, and States must be able to document how such persons are so qualified;¹
- States must implement a reliable validation procedure for affidavits accepted for continuing education credit claimed for credential renewal;²
- States must ensure that appraiser education courses are consistent with AQB Criteria;³ and
- States must ensure that appraiser education courses are consistent with AQB Criteria.⁴

ASC staff will confirm that appropriate corrective actions have been taken during the next Review. Michigan will remain on a two-year Review Cycle.
